Literature Review

Queer vs. Gay

- Gay" is defined as the physical attraction between men
- There are variations between gender expression and sexual orientation; this is where the term "queer" comes from. Social Society 2)

- Double life: family/society & private
- ❖ Fall of the misogynist social norm of machismo (Mcglew 13)
- Sexual role results in different levels of respect within gay community (Green; Carillo

The Birth of Modern Homosexuality

- November 19th, 1901
- ♦ 41 Queer men arrested for having a dance (Piltcher 152)
- ❖ First media reported incident of homosexual behavior (Irwin 354)

Gay Literature

- Started near the end of the 19th Century
- Inspired by La "Onda" literary movement of the 1960s (Prinkey 3)
- ❖ Gained popularity starting in the 1980s
- Salvador Novo was one of the first contributors (Prinkey 1)

Luis Zapata

Born April 27th, 1951 in Chilpancingo, Guerrero, México.


- Education: National Autonomous University of Mexico
- Inspiration: to change the enigmas around homosexuality in Mexico
- Uses a form of realistic fiction to anonymously share the experiences his friends have faced as homosexual males

- ❖ La "Onda"
 - Colloquialisms
 - > Sexual relationships
 - Urban settings
- Classified as:
 - Novela Picaresca
 - > Testimonial Report
- ❖ Tells the story of *Adonis Garcia*
 - Navigates living in Mexico City
 - > Experience as gay male & prostitute
 - Self actualization & development journey

Prostitution

- Underground subculture of LGBT+
- Induction into the world of prostitution
- Desensitization of true love & sexual acts
- Deception & the feeling of defeat
- Discovery of self comfort




Nightlife

- Clubs & Prostitution
- Exposure to drugs & alcohol
 - Self control issues
 - Unhealthy Coping Mechanisms
 - "Marijuana was something like paradise"(110)
- Mental Health
 - > Paranoia
 - Attachment issues

El vampiro de la Colonia Roma- Analysis

Scepticism

- Casts Judgment
 - > People
 - Activities
- Feels alone in the world
- Criticizes Prostitution at first
- ❖ Negativity & Mental Health
- Self introspection
- Development of an open mind
 - Concept of being transgender
 - one day you must have realized that he wasn't interested in being gay, right? But woman because it's different, right?" (166)



Colloquialisms

- Colloquialisms within the stream of consciousness
- Type of Spanish common within Mexico City
- Memory & Hope
 - > "I had dreams to feel the warmth of a home" (20)
- Realization of Homosexuality
 - So I decided to toss women to the side"
 (20)

Mario Bellatín

Born in México City, México in July 23, 1960, but raised in Peru.

- Education: Santo Toribio de Mogrovejo and University of Lima
- Fascinated by the creative aspects of writing, often using mystery as a writing technique.

Works: Las mujeres de sal (1986), Efecto invernadero (1992), Canon perpetuo (1993), Damas chinas (1995), Poeta ciego (1998), Flores (2001)



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Salón de belleza (1994)

- Organization:
 - > Reflection
 - Retrospection
- Style:
 - Internal Monologue
- Tells about the protagonist's experience
 - > Set in an nameless, urban city
 - Nameless protagonist
 - Protagonist reflects on the transformation of his life and the effects of the illness



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Salón de belleza- Analysis

Illness

- Is not identified
 - > No cure
- Condemned to ostracism
 - Also by members of the LGBT+community
- Underlying antagonist is death
 - Presented as an illness



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Death & Denial

- Process of acceptance
 - Difficulty in accepting inevitable death
 - Unhealthy coping mechanisms presented as rules in El Moridero
- Total separation from society
 - Religion
 - ➤ Hope
 - > Family

Salón de belleza- Analysis

Spaces

- Clandestine subculture of LGBT+
- Portion of novel that reflects the happiness of the protagonist
 - > In clubs with friends
 - Took women's clothes in bags to crossdress on location, for safety
- Creation of a safe space in El Salón
 - "Only women seem to not focus their attention to stylists dressed mostly in women's clothes." (24)

Simbolism

- The relationship between the conditions of El Salón and the fish tanks
 - Starting to lose interest in one is mirrored by interest of the other
- El Salón & El Moridero
 - Both are places meant to symbolize comfort and consolation
- !llness
 - Inevitable death
 - Identifying as LGBT+

Prostitution

The experience & power struggle

Isolation & Exclusion

Internal and external factors cause mental health issues

*both experience discrimination in their daily lives

Cynicism

The transformation of the protagonists throughout the novels

El vampiro: works as a prostitute & many times was taken advantage of physically & financially

El *Salón*: contains an anecdote about a male prostitute who was violated in a bathhouse.

El vampiro: confronts attachment issues and depends on substance abuse

El *Salón*: adopts an over controlling nature that does not allow anyone to gain his trust

El vampiro: a journey towards self acceptance, is presented by the life of the individual

El *Salón*: a view into the downfall of a person

Conclusions


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Both authors effectively utilize internal monologues to present the queer male experience through unique gay literature.

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
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
